

Retraction Policy

The editors or author may decide to retract an article following publication in PPP. This best practice is adopted for article retraction by PPP.

A retraction can be made under the advice of members of the scholarly community, where the editors:

- have evidence that the findings are unreliable, either as a result of honest mistake or misconduct;
- discover the findings have been published elsewhere, and this has not been properly referenced or justified;
- have evidence of plagiarism;
- discover undeclared competing interests.

The retraction process:

- A retraction note titled "Retraction: [article title]" signed by the authors and/or the
 editor is published in a subsequent issue of the journal and listed in the contents
 list.
- In the electronic version, a link is made to the original article.
- The online article is preceded by a screen containing the retraction note. It is to this screen that the link resolves; the reader can then proceed to the article itself.
- The original article is retained unchanged save for a watermark on the .pdf indicating on each page that it is "retracted."
- The HTML version of the document is removed.
